RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

December is a time for stories. There is one great Christmas story, and we will hear and see it again this year. But first, let me tell you another. Picture a town on the Mediterranean many centuries ago. Behind it mountains tower up before dropping almost vertically to the sea. The settlement clusters around the small deepwater port that provides its purpose and livelihood. The place is Myra in the early 4th century. A vital port on the long and inhospitable coast that offered rare and valuable safe harbour between the provinces of Africa and the Roman Empire's capital. Myra is like a service station, useful, sometimes a welcome sight, but rarely loved.

I want you to picture the town at night. Look in closer, zooming in over the tile roofs, the maze of streets, boats riding the gentle tide at rest in the harbour, watchmen making their patrols as the last few stagger home from the Inns and Taverns, until you come to a single small dwelling in the tangle of whitewashed houses. It could be described as simple. There is not much inside in the way of furniture, but the few pieces that are there are good quality but worn. In a single bed three young girls are sleeping. Their father, a little aged by worry, sits by the glowing embers of the dying fire. Once prosperous, he now barely has enough to get by. Things are only getting worse, and his daughters are approaching the age of marriage. Without anything to offer as a dowry for one daughter, let alone three the prospects look bleak. If debts are called in everything he has could be taken, he and his children bonded into slavery. Without prospect of marriage for his daughters, the only option might be to sell the only thing they have, themselves. In any case, the 4th century did not deal kindly with poor unmarried unprotected young women. Their plight is known, but all their neighbours and remaining friends have offered is sympathy and pity.

As the father begins to doze, a shadow moves in the street outside, and a hooded figure creeps stealthily towards the house. A hand emerges from the recesses of its robe, and there is a clink and the faint glint of something metal concealed. Reaching up to the window the figure pushes something through, and it lands with a sudden thud on the floor inside. The father wakes with a start, waking his daughters in turn. Quickly and cautiously the father moves to investigate this parcel whilst his children crowd round to see. Later, when the story is told and retold, people will say that the bag landed in one of the girl's shoes or snagged in a stocking hanging up to dry.

In the mystery bag they find a wealth of coins, enough to provide a very hansom dowry, to bargain for a comfortable future. There is no sign of where it came from, nor any clue when they look outside. Charity at this time was rare, anonymous charity unheard of. The miracle, as they saw it, was repeated the next night, waking the house - sleeping more soundly than they had in months - with another clinking thud. The night after they waited up to see what would happen. It was a long vigil, with false starts at every sound in the street, but a little past midnight there came the now familiar thud of the third gift. They rushed outside in time to glimpse a recognisable figure running away down the street. The anonymous donor was Nicholas, the young leader of the persecuted Christian community in the town.

Born when Christianity was illegal he was elected leader as a young man, on becoming a priest he sold his possessions, and distributed the proceeds anonymously to those in need in the town. Now remembered as St. Nicholas (or Santa Clause in Holland) there are many miracles credited to him, as well as his work to reprieve prisoners condemned to death, distribute food in times of famine, and set out the Creed at the first Christian Council. However, it is a simple act of charity, not miraculous, but Divinely inspired, that has been best remembered. Even through the centuries, we can still understand what it is to be in need and to be offered help.

If you would like to know more about the great story that shaped Nicholas' life, and the lives and acts of millions before and since, you are invited to join us this December at St. Michael's. It is an invitation that does not wear out. Until then, God bless you, have a happy Advent and a Merry Christmas.

Poppy Appeal -Thank You

Thank you Aynho for your very generous support to the Royal British Legion's Poppy Appeal. This year we raised £940 from our house to house collections which beat our record year by a good £100, and is very generous of you all. Huge thanks to the house to house collectors on your streets who bothered you for that first 24 hours as the Appeal got underway late last month.

Just for awareness it became apparent to the village during the year that two brothers, Joseph and Ernest Seccull, born in Aynho in the 1890s but who were enlisted into the Army from a village near Learnington, were both killed during the First World War. Their names do not appear on any village memorial. For whatever reason they are not listed on Aynho's memorial either – probably as they left here as infants. We called their names alongside the other 14 very well-known/remembered names this year at the Act of Remembrance Service at St Michael's which was special. In 2025 we will consider and consult whether we record more permanently the Seccull brothers – "lest we forget".
